I had a wonderful time completing my Turing Scheme placement at the forensic psychiatric clinic of the Universitätsmedizin Rostock, in Germany. This experience offered insights into both research and practice within a clinical setting.

For the research aspect, I got involved in the PART-Beirat and worked on updating training materials for patients wanting to join the participatory research board. My highlight was observing participatory research meetings, as these gave me insight into the practicalities of involving patients in research and allowed me to directly engage with patients outside of a therapeutic setting. It has to be mentioned here, that I found myself in the very privileged position of being half German and understanding the language. I hope to carry this commitment to involving people with lived experience forward within my professional development.

Another highlight were the English conversation classes my fellow intern Joanna organised. We had three engaging sessions with patients, where we discussed everything from the differences between the German and English prison systems, to German culture (mostly Techno and Schlager), to deep philosophical topics. The patients were incredibly open and willing to share insights into their personal lives, experiences and aspirations. These insights were incredibly impactful and I am grateful to the patients for trusting us enough to share these with us.

I furthermore gained insight into the multidisciplinary nature of forensic psychiatric care. I had several opportunities to meet with a range of professionals (psychologists, medical doctors, social workers, nurses, probation workers, etc.) to gain insight into their work. Having just graduated university, this was incredibly valuable to deciding my future career path. I additionally had the opportunity to join occupational therapy sessions in the clinic, namely sports and cooking. This was another great opportunity to engage with patients, and gave me insight into what their daily life at the clinic looks like.

I am incredibly grateful to everyone involved for making this experience possible and for being so welcoming. This experience has been truly rewarding and I am grateful to have had this opportunity.
